- Neighbor Nancy Teague-Horner provided a handout and reminded neighbors that, due to a change in law, all Florida voters who vote-by-mail must submit a NEW mail ballot request to their county Supervisor of Elections. Guest Speakers:

- FWC Officer Matthew Lamoureux: The officer explained that coyotes are here to stay. Eradication efforts don't work. On average, coyotes weigh between 25-40 lbs., have 6 pups per year, and travel in packs of 6. Coyotes are most active at dawn and dusk. One of the benefits of coyotes is that they eat mammals and rodents. They run ditch lines and can jump fences. Do not feed cats and dogs outside----get rid of the food source. Coyotes will attack cats and small dogs (don't use long leashes). Ways to deter: hazing (make noises---scream, yell, clap loudly, soda can with pennies), use motion-sensor sprinklers. Can hire a trapper to deal with coyote issue. Criminal charges if caught feeding a coyote.
- **CSO Chea Lance:** In looking at the stats from March-May, main issue was vehicle burglaries, less than 10 reports. Tyrone Middle School bus circle on 22nd Ave. should be completed by next school year. Neighbors expressed concerns about kids driving golf carts. Golf carts should have tags and be registered; must be licensed to drive. Also a concern about dogs off leashes: dogs are required to be on leashes at the park.
- **Councilmember Copley Gerdes**: Please continue to have patience regarding Central Ave. redevelopment from 58th Street to Park. State funds for light enhancements on 66th Street between 38th Avenue and Central Avenue. Pinellas County School Board approved the sale of land to the city for Fire Station #2 at 26th Ave. and 66th Street (station will face 66th St.). Trop. Stadium negotiations are still ongoing. There were questions by attendees about reclaimed water on 26th Ave. and about when the main library will re-open. Councilman will find out more details.

Jessica Salmond (Communications and Marketing Manager, Friends of Strays): Jessica began her presentation about Community Cats with some trivia questions: female cat can first become pregnant at 4 mo. old; usually has 3-5 kittens per litter; can have (in FL) 3-4 litters per year. While Friends of Strays doesn't have a front facing vet clinic, they spay and neuter thousands of "community" (feral) cats. F.O.S is a no-kill shelter. If you ever come across kittens, wait several hours before you remove them (i.e. wait for return of mother). It is against code to let cats roam outside; there is also a code that indicates cat food should not be outside for more than 3 hours per day. "TNVR": trap, neuter, vaccinate, return (way of humanely reducing population of community cats over time). There are lots of ways to help and get involved: 1.) Kitten Heroes 2.) Puppy Project. It's kitten season and F.O.S. is looking for fosters (be in touch also if you need volunteer hours). https://www.friendsofstrays.org/community-cats
